And so I invite you to wait on the Lord with me this Advent season. Wait by lighting your candles, wait by praying, reading, learning and worshiping. Wait with the expectation that God is going to break through and that even if things seem hazy and unclear right now, there will be a moment when the light will dawn and we will together say: I have seen a great light."

We had a great time hosting our Fall Church Picnic, with great food and great fellowship. We had pumpkins available for people to write what they were thankful for. Here are some photos from it:













Organ Update

New Church Logo

At our first outdoor worship service in June, Pastor Stephanie was having a conversation with Dick and Nancy Quanstrom about the beautiful crosses that Dick has made for TMPC. In conversation, Dick shared about the Chapel cross and the difference in color between the cross which was a dark brown wood and the circle on the outside which was a light brown wood. Dick shared that the cross was made from a tree that fell on the property of TMPC. The "heart" wood comes the center of a tree and is a darker color and, on the cross in the chapel, it is the wood that makes up the cross. The outer section was made from younger wood toward the outer edge of the same tree. This outer section is known as "sapling" wood. Despite coming from the same tree, the two pieces were of a dramatically different color and age.

This cross has become a standard symbol around TMPC with each new staff person having they picture taken in front of this beautiful cross. In addition, there is another replica of this cross in the Fellowship Hall.




Inclusivity Update

In June of 2020 the Inclusivity Team put together a broad based plan including five key areas that the team would focus their work. One of the areas of focus was mental health and addiction. Many who struggle with mental health concerns and addiction often have a difficult time entering into a church community in an honest and vulnerable way due to social stigmas around addiction and mental health. The Inclusivity Team has spent much of the fall exploring these areas and praying about how to be more inclusive of those who are struggling. We wanted to keep you up to date with the work we have done.

Our intern Jamie White led a study this fall on the book Mental Health and the Church's Mission which encouraged the church to speak more about mental health concerns and consider beginning small groups that could be a safe place of welcoming for those who are struggling with anxiety, depression and more.



We met with Larry Beley and asked how we could better serve our current Foglifters group. Larry requested more time and space. There is a great need for a noon meeting in the area. In November, the Session approved a noon meeting of AA at TMPC on Tuesdays and Thursdays. In addition, the Inclusivity Team agreed to attend some of the AA meetings to learn and understand what the journey looks like.

We received a request during this time from a local Narcotics Anonymous Group (NA) who has been unable to meet inside due to Covid and has been having a hard time with meaningful connection over Zoom. The session received this request and approved a request to further conversations and allow space for this group to meet.



Many who struggle with mental health and addiction often find it hard to enter into a church community

Pastor Stephanie attended a Faith Leaders Summit with New Hope Cares in November of 2020 that addressed ways in which local faith communities could join together to help those suffering from addiction in our communities. Though there was a lot of discussion, there were two concrete take aways that everyone can take part in and learn about:

- Empty all prescription drugs that you are currently not taking from your home at an approved site. This is a great source of struggle for an addict and often becomes an entry point for teens who are pressured by peers to find prescription medicines in family medicine cabinets. Click here for a list of places to drop off prescription drugs.
- Obtain a Narcan Nasal Spray. This spray, which works like any nasal spray, can help even if someone inside your home has taken an incorrect dose of opioids. It is free and has saved over 1,000 lives in Bucks County this year. It cannot harm the recipient so even if it is given to someone who is not having an overdose it will not do any damage. 
